Buckinghamshire Archaeological Society

The Society's year of 170th anniversary celebrations concludes with a lecture at the Radcliffe Centre, Buckingham, on Saturday 3 November at 2.30, when David Green, archaeologist formerly with Bucks County Council, will be speaking on *The Evolution of Buckingham, 911-2018: From the Saxons to Today*. Our usual Saturday afternoon lecture series at the County Museum, Aylesbury, resumes on 8 December with Professor Ian Beckett speaking on *The End of "the War to End All Wars"*.

The Active Archaeology Group's programme of monthly Tuesday evening lectures began on 18 September and runs through to May.

The report on the *Archaeological Investigations at Missenden Abbey, 1983-88*, by Yvonne Edwards, Jill Hender and Marion Wells, published as Part 2 of this year's *Records of Bucks*, was launched in June at Missenden Abbey (price £12, plus £2 p&p).

Continuing projects include:

- Digitisation of the Society's collection of estate maps, held at the Centre for Bucks Studies.
- Archival research into the historic site at Quarrendon using manorial and other records mainly held in the Lee (Dillon) MSS at Oxfordshire History Centre.

Haddenham Museum

In November 2018 Haddenham Museum will celebrate the 20th anniversary of its foundation. During the weekend of 24/25th November we will have a number of events at the Methodist Church, adjacent to the Museum, with displays, speakers and activities. It will also be the occasion of the publication of the latest edition of the "Haddenham Chronicles", which has been held back from its usual Spring publication date in order to coincide with the celebrations.

High Wycombe Society

The High Wycombe Society has had an eventful Summer culminating in a Golden Anniversary celebration at Wycombe Abbey on 5th August. Wycombe Abbey is now a prestigious girls' school but was formerly home to successive Lord Carringtons in the nineteenth century, and prior to that as Loakes Manor to three successive Earls of Shelburne in the eighteenth. Lunch was served in Big School, the hall built by the third Lord Carrington as a games room for his four daughters. A project was undertaken prior to the event to analyse the hatchments which had been removed from the local church and used as heraldic decorations, thereby preserving them in the ceiling. We are looking forward this Autumn to two evening talks: on Friday 12th October at The Riverside in High Wycombe, Dave Scott, co-author of "Wycombe's Contribution to Aviation", will be coming to talk about the subject of his latest book "George Holt Thomas - a pioneer aviator and founder of the AirCo company"; while on 19th November at Trinity United Reformed Church, we are joining forces with Wycombe Wildlife Group to host Ted Green, founder of the Ancient Tree Forum for a talk about Ancient woodland. Milton Keynes City Discovery Centre

Milton Keynes City Discovery Centre has been organising a series of lunchtime lectures on behalf of the MK Archives group (which consists of representatives from MKCDC, the Centre for Buckinghamshire Studies, Milton Keynes Council and Libraries, and the Living Archive). These have been held once a month at Milton Keynes Central Library on topics such as unbuilt MK, international new towns and women who made MK. We've had an average of sixteen attendees per talk and encourage everyone to bring their lunch along. The talks are to advertise MK Archives and encourage participation in our consultation survey on an archive service for Milton Keynes. The next talk is on 11th October and will be Roger Kitchen talking about Albert French, a First World War soldier from New Bradwell.

National Paralympic Heritage Trust

The National Paralympic Heritage Trust was established in July 2015 to 'enlighten and inspire future generations by celebrating, cherishing and bringing the Paralympic Heritage and its stories of human endeavour to life'. The team at the NPHT comprises of four members based at the Olympic Lodge at Stoke Mandeville Stadium.

The last few months have been a busy period for us, earlier this year we delivered our pilot exhibition hosted by Norwich Cathedral. The exhibition was well received, attracting 7000 visitors and providing us with some excellent learning for our future regional exhibitions. The first of these regional exhibitions will be in Bradford starting in January 2019. We are also looking forward to the opening of the Heritage Centre at Stoke Mandeville Stadium in March 2019.
