The secret life of the farm

Farm buildings are affected all along the HS2 high-speed rail line – and every one has revealed a secret. The farm building is not ordinary at all: with hidden stairs, lost architectural masterpieces, life upstairs and downstairs, spies and saboteurs.

What came before St Mary's?

For nearly 1,000 years parishioners at Stoke Mandeville worshipped in their old church unaware of what lay beneath their feet. Excavation has revealed fascinating Roman remains, placing church and churchyard in a much wider historic landscape.

Shining new light on Grim's Ditch, Great Missenden

Surveys and excavations of the enigmatic Grim's Ditch have shown how it evolved as a late Iron Age bank and ditch, possibly reusing an earlier Bronze Age land boundary - and how the Roman period changed the landscape again.

Going to town: Assessing Roman Fleet Marston

Thousands of fieldwork records, finds and environmental samples are producing a picture of domestic, commercial, religious and other aspects of daily life is this bustling and diverse roadside market town where Akeman Street crosses several other important routeways, north-west of Aylesbury.

Blackgrounds: 1,000 years of settlement

Where the line crosses Northamptonshire archaeologists have traced a settlement that started in the early Iron Age, in the sixth century BCA, then continued as a Roman small town, abandoned only after the Romans had left. A wealth of finds illustrates all aspects of life across a thousand years of intensive occupation, continuity in a period of great cultural changes.

Excavations at a deserted medieval village

The deserted medieval village of Radbourne, up the line of HS2 in Warwickshire, has been known for years but unexplored. Now the proximity of HS2 has triggered an excavation that has revealed not only much about how its medieval inhabitants lived, but also prehistoric features which show its enduring popularity as a place of settlement.
